IMPACTFUL RESEARCH

We aim to do more than add to the canon of knowledge on poverty in the UK. We aim to deliver impactful research that can be used by others to tackle poverty and the problems it presents. The success of our work should be measured according to the difference that it makes to the lives of people experiencing poverty.

PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

We are firmly committed to sharing our knowledge with, and providing advice to, those who are working to tackle poverty in Scotland. We actively engage civil society through formal committee work, participating in public conversation and debate, and offering informal advice.

DEVELOPING RESEARCH TALENT

SPIRU acknowledges its responsibility to develop the next generation of poverty researchers and analysts. Providing opportunity and developing talent are core to the work of the Unit.

PROGRESS ... highlights in 2020/21

COVID-19 RELATED WORK

SPIRU was responsive to the need for evidence-based research and commentary to understand how Scotland was responding to the challenge of managing COVID-19 in order to protect its most vulnerable citizens. For example, we completed a nationwide review of local action to tackle food insecurity during the coronavirus crisis for the Poverty and Inequality Commission; the Action Group on Child Poverty (Scottish Leaders Forum of Scottish Government) commissioned us to research how local leaders were responding to the challenge of tackling child poverty amidst the crisis; and we evaluated the work of the Inverclyde Community Action Research Group. Throughout the period, we also engaged in public debate relating to the impact of COVID on people experiencing poverty.

INFORMING POLICY AND PRACTICE

We continued to offer advice through formal and informal channels, with a view to informing policy and practice. Most notably, we continued to work to help shape local responses to tackle child poverty in Scotland, as part of the Local Child Poverty Co-ordination Group, led by the Improvement Service/Public Health Scotland-led. Some of our research outputs were also written for impact. For example, in February 2021, the Poverty and inequality Commissioned published our collection of case studies of strengthening free school meal provision in Scotland, and in April 2021, we published a practical resource to guide local analysis of mapping holiday out of school provision.

NEW AUTHORS

Our commitment to support the development of new research talent led to two researchers and eighteen Work Placement students co-authoring their first research report; two researchers and fiveWork Placement students delivering their first presentation at an academic conference; and tworesearchers publishing their first academic journal paper.

NEW OPPORTUNITIES

SPIRU has pioneered the introduction of 12 month posts (0.2 FTE) for pre-PhD students seeking to gain research experience in an applied research unit. In 2020 and 2021, we employed our second and third cohort of new talent. We extended the range of opportunities for new talent in the summer of 2021 by offering two SPIRU summer scholarships and hosting scholarships funded by the Robertson Trust and the Carnegie Trust for the Universities of Scotland.

OUR CORE TEAM

SPIRU comprises two Co-Directors (Professor John McKendrick and Professor Stephen Sinclair), three Theme Leaders (Dr Janet Greenlees, Dr Ruth Lightbody and Dr Thomas Montgomery), two researchers (Clara Pirie and Sebastian Stettin) and two PhD Research Students (Jed Graham and Jill Marchbank). We are a multi-disciplinary team, often working as an interdisciplinary collective, with specialist disciplinary expertise in history, human geography, political science, sociology and social policy.

OUR SUPPORTING CAST

We offer opportunities throughout the year for next generation researchers to work with SPIRU to gain experience in applied poverty research. At any given time, the ranks of SPIRU are likely to be boosted by Social Sciences students on Work Placement, GCU students gaining credits for a Common Good Award, early career researchers contributing to specific research projects, and students who have secured scholarships for short-term project work. OUR NEXT GEN. COMMITMENT

SPIRU is committed to developing the next generation of poverty researchers in Scotland. We offer a range of opportunities throughout the year. However, we do not believe that next generation talent should be employed as unpaid or underpaid Interns. Our Next Gen. talent is either remunerated at GCU Researcher rates, or is working toward formal degree/Common Good Award credit.

PARTNERS ... who we work with

THE POVERTY ALLIANCE

SPIRU has a Memorandum of Understanding with The Poverty Alliance, Scotland's national anti-poverty network. We share the same vision of working toward a Scotland without poverty and we pursue research in the same manner – wherever possible and practicable, ensuring that the voice of lived experience of poverty is central to our work. In 2020/21, we collaborated with The Poverty Alliance on research for the Edinburgh Poverty Commission, the Poverty and Inequality Commission, and Perth & Kinross Council. We write a quarterly Research Comment in the Alliance's, Scottish Anti-Poverty Review.

COLLABORATING PARTNERS

We are keen to work alongside others with shared interests and complementary strengths in order to better understand the challenges that poverty presents. In 2020/21, our research and events have involved collaborations with other research centres within GCU (Yunus Centre for Social Business and Health, and the WiSE for Economic Justice), colleagues from a wide range of universities (including Georgetown, Glasgow, Harvard, Heriot-Watt, Maryland, Robert Gordons, Strathclyde, UCL and Washington) and organisations beyond academia (including ASSIST FM, Child Poverty Action Group Scotland, East Neuk Analytics, Public Health Scotland, The Data Lab and The Urban School Food Alliance).

CONSULTING PARTNERS

CASE STUDY: INTERNATIONAL **ACTIONS ON SCHOOL MEALS** IN TIMES OF CRISIS

SPIRU collaborated with a range of universities and public to host a USA/Scotland Knowledge Exchange event on the eve of International School Meals Day in March 2021. Almost 200 participated in this online event, which was addressed by the Deputy First Minister and Cabinet Secretary for Education and Skills (Scotland) and the Deputy Administrator for Child Nutrition Programs (USA). The event provided a platform to share practices, research and resources, and to explore evolving policy in the delivery of school food and country responses to challenges stemming from the global COVID-19 public health crisis and associated food insecurity and economic ramifications. PROJECTS ... our research work

Our research projects are summarised in Annex 4. This includes:

WORKING FOR GOVERNMENT

We continue to provide research intelligence to support the work of local government, as it seeks to deliver its stautory obligations under the Child Poverty (Scotland) Act 2017. In 2020-21, we managed an Action Learning Set to explore how transport could contribute to tackling child poverty locally; we contributed to research on measuring poverty locally; and we started a review of how Local Child Poverty Action Reports were contributing to national goals.

WORKING FOR THE POVERTY AND INEQUALITY COMMISSION

We continue to inform the work of Scotland's Poverty and Inequality Commission. In 2020/21, the Commission published three of our reports - a nationwide review of local action to tackle food insecurity during the coronavirus crisis; a review of the literature on co-production with people experiencing poverty in Scotland; and a report showcasing case studies of good practice in delivering free school meals in Scottish schools.

WORKING FOR LOCAL ORGANISATIONS AND COMMUNITY PROJECTS

We have been commissioned to undertake research for organisations based in Aberdeen City, Aberdeenshire, Argyll and Bute, Comhairle Eilean Siar, Dundee, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Highland, Inverclyde, Moray, Orkney Isles, Renfrewshire, Shetland Isles and Stirling.

CASE STUDY: LEARNING FROM LOCAL RESPONSES TO CHILD POVERTY DURING THE COVID CRISIS

SPIRU was commissioned by the Scottish Government to advise the Scottish Leaders Forum on how Scotland's local authorities, local Health Boards and key community partners had responded to the challenge of tackling poverty during the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. Thirty-one interviews with senior leaders across six local authorities were undertaken in the Autumn to explore local decision-making processes, identify promising practices, and to reflect upon what might be learned from this experience that could inform future practice. PUBLICATIONS ... our outputs

A full list of our presentations in 2020/21 is presented in Annex 1.

SPIRU staff produced a wide range of publications, each of which was tailored to a particular audience. We also worked with Platform, the community arts organisation based in Easterhouse to publish a range of 'Glasgow Shorts', as part of their Mail Art project. These Glasgow shorts challenged the narrative of growing up in deprived neighbourhoods, reflecting on the auto-biographies of successful Scottish football players who grew up in the city.

OUR SIGNATURE TEXT -POVERTY IN SCOTLAND 2021

Once again, SPIRU co-edited a Poverty in Scotland volume for the Child Poverty Action Group. Working alongside colleagues from The Poverty Alliance, WiSE Centre for Economic Justice and I-SPHERE at Herit-Watt University, this collection draws on the latest data and evidence to give an overview of the scale, nature and extent of poverty in contemporary Scotland. It also brings together contributions from leading academics and practitioners to explore how the tools that can be used to tackle poverty in Scotland.

PEDAGOGY ... our work in Education

WORK IN SCHOOLS

Most of our work in schools and pre-school settings is concerned with how poverty frames and constrains educational experiences. In 2020/21, we started to explore poverty as subject matter in school geography. When capacity permits, we also respond to requests for advice on poverty for project work in Modern Studies.

WORK WITH COLLEGES

Many Colleges in Scotland offer HNC and/or HND in Social Sciences and Childhood Studies. As with schools, when capacity permits, we have responded to requests to deliver presentations on poverty in Scotland to college students.

WORK PLACEMENT AT GCU

SPIRU offers degree-level BA Social Sciences students at GCU, the opportunity to work with SPIRU as part of their degree studies. We are demanding of our students who complete a weekly learning journal, in addition to submitting two pieces of work for SPIRU every week (core work for the Unit and a contribution to a group research project for an external organisation). In 2020/21, our Work Placement collective has published research reports for Greggs Foundation (evaluating a breakfast cart pilot project in East Renfrewshire) and Good Food Scotland (canvassing experiences of food insecurity in the Greater Pollok area of Glasgow). Almost thirty students worked with SPIRU on Work Placement in 2020/21.

UNDERGRADUATE STUDIES

SPIRU staff also contribute to the studies of Social Sciences, Psychology, Media Studies and Business students at GCU. At Level 1, these students are provided with a critical introduction to ideas of poverty and are invited to consider whether poverty and affluence co-exist in Glasgow through a fieldwork exercise. At degree level, BA Social Sciences students can elect to present for a full module on Poverty and Policy. We encourage critical thinking about poverty with almost 300 students every year, across the different modules and degree programmes at GCU.

SCHOLARSHIPS

We support students who pursue Vacation Scholarships and want to work with SPIRU. In 2020/21, undergraduate students – both from GCU and beyond – have secured funding from The Robertson Trust and the Carnegie Trust for the Universities of Scotland. We also supported two SPIRU Summer Studentships for BA Social Sciences students at GCU.

POSTGRADUATE ... opportunities

RESEARCH DEGREES

SPIRU is committed to support the development of the next generation of poverty researchers. Supervising PhD and MPhil research is important to the work of the Unit. We have dedicated office space for our PhD students and can support both full-time and part-time studies.

POVERTY IN MSC STUDIES

In 2020/21, SPIRU staff helped develop a new MSc Human Rights programme that started in the Autumn of 2021. This new degree focuses on applying social science knowledge and analytical approaches to secure human rights in practice in everyday settings. Among the modules offered are (i) Poverty, Rights and Citizenship; (ii) Transformative Social Science: Theorising In/Equality; and (iii) Social Movements and Activism for Change.

OPPORTUNITY BEYOND QUALIFICATION

Every year, we offer two postgraduate (or pre-postgraduate) students the opportunity to work with SPIRU as Researchers for a 12 month period, for one day per week. This provides a unique opportunity to acquire applied research experience – paid at GCU Researcher rates – while pursuing postgraduate study. Contributing to the core work of the Unit, our researchers are central to our success, while gaining experience in all aspects of research.

CONTINUING COMMITMENT

SPIRU delivers. Our plans for 2021/22 are to continue with our core activities, contributing to the development of research talent, engaging with civil society and the wider academic community, and producing impactful research.

SCOTTISH POVERTY BIBLIOGRAPHY

Over the Summer of 2021, we have developed the Scottish Poverty Bibliography. The Bibliography will serve as a single point of reference to the substantial grey literature that is produced by academics, national/local government officers, the Third Sector, social enterprises and others on poverty in Scotland. The Scottish Poverty Bibliography will be part of SPIRU's 'common good' offer to support the work of those who seek to tackle poverty in Scotland. The Bibliography will be launched during Challenge Poverty Week (October 2021) and will be accessible without cost to all.

COMMON GOOD AWARD

Over the Summer of 2021, we have developed a framework to extend the range of opportunities for GCU students to work with SPIRU to gain credit toward a Common Good Award. GCU students will be able to work with us to develop and demonstrate the Common Good competencies of active and global citizenship, responsible leadership, entreprenurial mindset, and confidence

EXTENDING OUR NETWORK

SPIRU is already well connected in academia and civil society. In 2021/22, we aim to strengthen our Network to raise awareness of our work and strengthen impact. We are also keen to extend our collaborations with other poverty researchers whose interests align with ours.

Appraising the Prospects for a Social Supermarket in South West Glasgow is our research report, which aims to inform the development of the Threehills Social Supermarket, which Good Food Scotland is planning to introduce in South West Glasgow. Led by Professor McKendrick, this work was co-authored by SPIRU Work Placement students. It summarises the thoughts of 247 survey respondents and 17 interviewees. This report has been finalised and will be available in the late Autumn of 2021.

GREGGS FOUNDATION

Pass Go for Grab-N-Go? An Evaluation of the Pilot Grab-N-Go Breakfast Cart Provision in Three Schools in East Renfrewshire

This is an evaluation of three pilot projects to introduce breakfast carts in schools in East Renfrewshire. Led by Professor McKendrick, this work was co-authored by SPIRU Work Placement students. It draws from fieldwork observation, surveys of pupils and teachers, and group interviews with secondary school pupils.

INVERCLYDE COMMUNITY ACTION GROUP

Not Just for a Crisis: Evaluation of the ICARG

SPIRU was invited to evaluate the work of the Inverclyde Community Action Group, a group of community-minded local leaders who came together to co-ordinate actions to support vulnerable citizens in Inverclyde during the early stages of the Covid-19 pandemic. SPIRU reviewed ICARG's work and interviewed eight key figures within the collective.

PERTH & KINROSS COUNCIL

Lived Experience of Child Poverty in Perth and Kinross is our research report, which aims to inform the development of Perth and Kinross Council's approach to tackling child poverty. It draws from interviews with 22 parents experiencing poverty across the length and breadth of the region. Co-authored with The Poverty Alliance, this research report is accompanied by ten service-sector briefings, each of which summarises key considerations for specific groups.
