Introduction to the Project	
<p>Biddulph Works Together is a partnership of organisations that work across Biddulph. Partners provide a range of opportunities and events for the community, from coffee mornings to community cinema sessions, craft activities and youth focused activities. The partnership is responsive to community needs and is promoted through the Town Council website and social media pages. They aim to help people in poverty but also to address other problems like loneliness. The partnership has identified needs within the town and sought to provide joined-up solutions to these, such as the provision of emergency food and fuel and a town-wide Christmas present appeal.</p>	



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Initial Idea

Who had the initial idea?			
Councillors felt they needed to do something as the cost-of-living crisis began to impact those who were most in need within the community. The Town Council already had good relations with a wide range of community groups, and called a meeting to see what partners could deliver. At first, the proposal was to turn the Town Hall into a warm space. This has taken place on some days of the week. However, they also provide food and warm spaces for people near to their homes, or within environments where they felt comfortable.			
How did the idea for the project come about?			
During and after the COVID-19 pandemic, agencies offered advice to the community. It became clear that needs could be met if they worked together to provide cost of living support, and so they created Biddulph Works Together.

Town councillors are the closest layer of government to residents, and they have a strong understanding of issues facing the community. The Town Council also had the capacity to move quickly to set up this project. The Town Council coordinated the first meeting of partners, and the project quickly grew from there with community groups keen to be involved.

The Town Council provides the funding for the project from its reserves. Each agency that wishes to deliver a new or enhanced service seeks funds from the Town Council. For example, there is a group that meets on a Tuesday morning (10 AM–12 PM). They wanted to support their current members and attract new members who may be in need. They asked if they could extend their session by an hour and provide a warm meal to those that attended the group. The Town Council waived the additional room rent and provided funding for food. The group makes pies, lasagne, and cottage pies, for example. They do so in advance of the session using the funds provided.

<p>Informal feedback from the community has been overwhelmingly positive. Community members state that the project is helpful and targets big issues within Biddulph. A piece of work completed by a community research team collected the following feedback. Those involved stated: it is “an excellent idea”, that “the project has brought the town together”, it has “helped the community to grow”, that they are “proud to have been part of it”, it has “helped us to understand the needs of Biddulph People”, that they are “privileged to be a part of a great group of hardworking, positive people/volunteers”, and that Biddulph Council are a “great Town Council, very proactive and community minded”. Other feedback included statements such as: “I work in Biddulph, and I can see what benefits this project has had on the local community” and “we have established important networks; we’ve ensured we’re not duplicating activity and resource and we’re referring our community members to other groups that we’re now aware.”</p>

Involve people who are committed to improve their local area, and to support others who aim to do so. Provide hot food served at each event. Always be willing to adapt and to respond. Understand that volunteers are keen to support their community, but don't make this too onerous. They are a valuable resource.

No, Biddulph Works Together aim to continue to serve the people of Biddulph. They hope to get funding from an external agency for an empowerment-type role. They have identified that there are a significant number of people within the community who do not know how to tackle issues such as getting repairs done or liaising with utility companies. This role would be a safety net for those that do not meet the threshold for social care support but need some support to tackle day-to-day challenges.	
How easily do you think this project could be replicated in another setting?	
Yes, it would be possible to replicate this project, providing there is a team of people that work well together and a healthy meeting environment where different ideas are welcome.	

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
