Introduction to the Project

Making it Work for Families is a multi-agency partnership project that brings together staff from Fife Gingerbread, Clued Up, Citizens Advice & Rights Fife and Fife Intensive Rehabilitation & Substance Use Team. The project aims to support lone parent, low income or unemployed families affected by current, historic, or at risk of substance use where there is a young person living at home who is in Primary 7 or in S1/S2 at High School. The team works collaboratively to offer whole family support that includes parental support, youth work, family learning, money advice, employment support and community rehabilitation for substance misuse.

The pilot recommended a co-production approach to ensure that the service meets the needs of service users. Follow up support for families exiting the service was also highlighted as an area for development to ensure that stability is maintained in the longer-term. It also stressed that caseloads should not be too big to ensure that trustful relationships can be built and that emerging issues which were not previously identified can be addressed.

Clued Up staff work in areas and schools across Fife. Staff engage with young people in their own spaces, for example, in school and they are a visible presence in communities on a Friday night. They identify young people who are repeatedly misusing drugs and alcohol. Staff are also known to guidance staff in schools.		
They also offer drop-in sessions and there is a community van that is known to young people from which staff offer free water and condoms.

Learning from Experience

What is working well?

The partnership between agencies is authentic and works well. This is facilitated by staff from the agencies sharing an office space. Stevan reported that staff feel part of a team and have benefited from meeting in person, as this has reduced the number of emails and written referrals.

What, if anything, is working less well?

Staff are overstretched, for example, one member of staff is working across eight schools. More funding would allow more support workers to be employed.

What are the key learning points that you'd like to share with other practitioners?

Early intervention and enhanced transitions from P7 to S1 are having a positive outcome for young people

Staff are keen to stress that a person-centred, tailored support is crucial to success i.e., that success looks different for everyone.

The project highlights the importance of supporting the whole family when dealing with complex issues such as substance misuse and employability issues. The 'whole family' approach for is particularly valuable for reducing isolation with adolescent groups.
