- Develop action plans to minimise risks, mitigate impacts and comply with environmental legislation and relevant codes of practice.
- Use resources more efficiently, including less energy and water.
- Produce less waste by pursuing waste minimisation, re-use and recycling opportunities,

- Enhance the environmental credentials of the on-campus catering offer.
- Specify and procure products and services with improved environmental credentials.
- Incorporate resource efficiency measures into all new construction and refurbishment projects.
- Identify and explore opportunities for enhancing biodiversity.
- Openly report its environmental performance.
- Annually review this policy and associated environmental management system.
